### Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's DNA Project

**WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women.  
To join under WVGS:**

1. Go to the State Library URL at: <http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml>
2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
3. Click on WVGS DNA Project.
4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form.
6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen.
7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one set.

**You will receive a confirmation in your e-mail box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA.** It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

**NEW! Discover close relatives and your ethnic percentages with Family Finder! Available to both males and females.**

Family Finder uses autosomal DNA (inherited from both the mother and father, four grandparents, eight great-grandparents, etc.) to provide you a breakdown of your ethnic percentages and connect you with relatives descended from any of your ancestral lines within approximately the last 5 generations.

### WVGS 2011 Financial Report

Our treasurer, **Joan Kaiser**, keeps our books for us and pays the bills. Our books were audited by WVGS member Ann Hill after the May meeting. She only found two errors, that had been corrected by the bank, and two other minor errors in recording. Thank you Ann for performing that duty for our Society and thank you Joan for doing an excellent job as Treasurer.

WVGS ended 2011 with a total of  
**\$16, 774.66.**

**Book Fund: \$4,317.76**

This fund is used to purchase books for the Oregon State Library. We received funds by individual donation, sale table, and by collecting donations at each meeting.

**Operations: \$1822.19**

This fund is used for expenses, such as postage, printing for the newsletter and Beaver Briefs, printing membership brochures, refreshments for meetings and fees for guest speakers. Monies deposited into this account are membership dues, research fees, donations for operations, and interest.

**Publications: \$1705.45**

This account is for printing publications and receives money from the sale of publications.

**Equipment/Ancestry.com \$4,279.26**

This account was built up to have a reserve in case we have to purchase new equipment. Also we added to it when we needed to pay half the cost of having Ancestry.com at the OSL. Since we now have Ancestry.com for free, this account is not active.

**Life Membership: \$4,650.00**

Life Membership money goes to this account, which is not to be used unless the Society is in financial difficulty.

June Program

The June speaker was **Emily Aulicino**, speaking about "**The Gene in Genealogy**", DNA testing. She went over the technical aspects and terms of DNA testing: four DNA Bases, STR (Short Tandem Repeats), mutations, Haplotypes, Genetic Difference, SNP (Single Nucleotide Polymorphism) and Haplogroups.

Emily then discussed the types of tests available: Y-DNA for males only, mtDNA for both males and females, and atDNA (autosomal) for both males and females. The Autosomal is the new Family Finder Test which finds matches anywhere on your 5-6 generation pedigree chart. SNP will determine your twig on the World Family Tree.

Concerns that Emily mentioned were the criminal justice system, health system, cloning, paternity and genetic genealogy, all of which are not part of genealogy DNA testing.

Emily is the regional coordinator and speaker for the International Society of Genetic Genealogists (ISOGG) for Oregon, Washington, and Idaho and is the administrator of several DNA projects, including WVGS.

Thank you, Emily, for an informative program, and for answering questions.

Alice LaViolette

We already know that Alice LaViolette does a wonderful job of working with WVGS and the Library. But this recognizes her work, including using **Ancestry.com**:

L-net, Oregon's Statewide Digital Reference Project (<http://www.oregonlibraries.net>), recognizes Alice LaViolette at the Oregon State Library for her excellent digital reference work while staffing the service in March 2012. Alice's transcript is online at <http://www.oregonlibraries.net/notable>

In this transcript, the patron came in looking for information on his great-grandfather and the great-grandfather's service during World War II as part of a school assignment. Alice asked several clarifying questions to determine if the patron was looking for more general information about World War II, or information more specific to the great-grandfather's experience.

Using an **ancestry** database, Alice found images of his **WWI and WWII registration cards**, which she emailed to the patron. She provided the patron with information found in the database, to confirm that she had found the correct person, then attempted to find an Oregonian obituary to further confirm the accuracy of the information she had found. When the patron asked if Alice could find out what battles the ancestor had fought in, she suggested that the patron could request military service records, either by writing to the **WWII National Personnel Records Center** (for which she provided the address) or requesting them online from the National Archives. The patron asked for more information about his ancestor, so Alice searched the **1930 Census**, where she found out some more information. The patron was able to use this to confirm that all of the information that she had found was about the right person. At the end of the chat, Alice emailed the transcript to the patron, so he would have all the information, and closed the conversation in a friendly and professional manner.

The Quality Team was impressed with the caliber and amount of resources that Alice used to help the patron and to verify that the information located was correct. Throughout the interaction, she also provided context for the resources offered, to help the patron understand what he might find useful on the various sites. She conducted an excellent reference interview, was very responsive to the patron's requests for more information, and had a professional and approachable demeanor throughout the chat.

As an expression of our appreciation, Alice was presented with flowers and a certificate at the Oregon Virtual Reference Summit. Please join us in congratulating her!

### SUGGESTED PURCHASES - DONATIONS WANT- ED

Donors pay half and, WVGS's book fund pays the remaining half. Donations are tax deductible in accordance with section 501(c)(3) of the US Tax Code. The books go into our collection for use of our members, with donor's getting first use. When the books are no longer being checked out they are donated to the Oregon State Library for use of the public.

### Family Surname Files

WVGS has four filing cabinets in the Microfilm Room filled with a variety of genealogical materials. There are family genealogies given to the Society or Library, beginning with the "Book of Adam" by Harold King Bowen which starts with Adam and traces lineage to immigrants to America from England. Some of the genealogies were in the Library collection but have been taken out and are no longer in the OSL catalog and are now in these filing cabinets. Many files contain family group sheets, information that was collected by previous Corresponding Secretaries in response to requests for genealogical information, copies of death certificates and newspaper articles.

Although these files are available to the public to be looked at, they are seldom used and hard to search through. We are asking for volunteers to work on an index for these files that would be easier to use and would be posted on our website. If you're looking for a project to work on, let me know! Daily volunteers are also working on it in their spare time. **Liz Tice**



## Research

### Divorce Records

We recently had a request for information on a divorce. WVGS's part in this was small, and the person requesting the information volunteered what it took to be successful, hoping that it may help someone else.

The Oregon State Library does have some divorce indexes, as follows:

**1946-1960, 1966-1970 on Microfilm**

**1961-2008 on Microfiche**

The **Oregon State Archives** has some records, listed by county at <http://arcweb.sos.state.or.us/pages/records/aids/vital.html>

The indexes at the Oregon State Library give the county in which the divorce was granted and the case number. This information was looked up, with the recommendation of next contacting the county involved, in this case Marion County.

Corresponding Secretary Sue Masse provided the following information:

- Divorces are usually handled at the county level, as a "vital record." The archives holds some records, and the others are held at the county level.
- Go to Oregon State Archives, Vital Records (<http://arcweb.sos.state.or.us/vital.html#county>) and choose the county. I picked Marion for the example, and Marion County is about 2/3 of the way down the page. You will see that Marion County divorces from 1852 to 1921 are held at the archives, and can be searched. Divorce records in general are found in Circuit Court case files, dockets or journals. The arson fire at the courthouse in 2005 destroyed many of the case files, so you will have to search dockets and journals for years 1971 to 1984. Recent divorce records may be restricted.

- Of course, every county is different. And every county sets its own charges for retrieving the files. If we can determine the date, county and case number from our micro form indexes, we will save the client a great deal of trouble and possible expense, because they can then determine who holds the records, so they know where to go to get copies of the actual files.

Jim Thompson then submitted "**My secret technique for getting divorce papers from Marion County**":

1. Write a letter to the court asking them for what you want. I wrote asking them for the divorce papers and accompanying agreements between the parties to the divorce.  
 Marion County Circuit Court  
 Attn: Court Records  
 PO Box 12889  
 Salem, Or 97309
2. Include the divorce file number (from microfilm records at your library), your address, telephone number and email in the letter. I just gave them my email address but no phone number. (I am sure you can do this in person.)
3. They emailed me back asking for a money order for \$3.00 for the copies. It can vary by the number of pages you ask for. \$3.00 was for about 15 pages.
4. Five days later I got an email message telling me to log into their system, create a password, and further directed me how to download the material. Worked like a charm!
5. From the divorce papers I got the date/location of marriage, the names of their 2 adult children and all of their birth dates. I also got a bunch of other stuff that may have little genealogical significance.



## Research

### Local History Archives, Park County, Colorado by Valerie Beaudrault

**[www.parkcoarchives.org/](http://www.parkcoarchives.org/)**

Park County is located in central Colorado with Fairplay as its county seat. A variety of resources are available on the website of the Park County Local History Archives.

#### Photos

The Park County Local History Archives has a collection of more than 3,000 photographs. A sampling of them may be found on the website.

#### Oral History

Interviews of Park County residents can be found in the Oral History collection. The Park County Historic Preservation Advisory Committee (PCHPAC) and the Park County Local History Archives were involved in the creation of the collection. Sixty-four interviews were conducted and nineteen have been completely transcribed and uploaded to the website.

#### Obituaries

An index to obituaries published in Park County newspapers references more than 1,600 records. The deaths occurred during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. The data fields in this alphabetical by surname index are name (full name), birth date, birth place, death date, death place, and source. The source field includes the title of the newspaper in which the obituary was published and the date it was published.

#### Cemeteries

There are five cemetery databases on the website: the Buckskin Cemetery, Como Cemetery, Fairplay Cemetery, and two databases with data from various cemeteries. The records are sorted alphabetically by surname. The data fields vary and may include name, birth date, death date, inscription, cemetery name, grave location, and notes/comments/remarks.

#### Marriages

The marriage record data was extracted from the original marriage books at the Park County Clerk's Office. The records cover the period from September 1881 through August 1950. The data fields in the alphabetical by groom's surname database are groom's full name, where from, bride's full name, where from, date of marriage, place of marriage, and book and page number. There are more than 1,000 records in the index.



## Around the US

### Arizona and Colorado Cemetery Databases

**Evergreen Cemetery, Bisbee, Arizona**

The city of Bisbee is the county seat of Cochise County, Arizona. It is located in the southeastern part of the state, about eighty miles southeast of Tucson. The Bisbee Mining & Historical Museum has made a cemetery database available on its website.

Established in 1892, Evergreen Cemetery replaced the Old City Park Cemetery. Old City Park Cemetery was located upslope from the drinking water wells in Brewery Gulch and it was felt that this posed a health risk to Bisbee residents. Beginning in 1914, the people buried in the old cemetery were moved to Evergreen Cemetery.

There are just over 15,000 records in the database. The information in the Evergreen Cemetery database comes from the following sources: City of Bisbee ledgers recording sale of graves (1912–1999), Mrs. Lillian Bilyeu Banchi & Mr. John Banchi's compilation of "mortuary, church, and sexton" records (originals not available, 1927–1964), and Southern Arizona Genealogical Society & Arizona Pioneer's Historical Society records (1884–1926).

The cemetery database project is in its first phase. The second phase will include a physical inventory of the gravesites and information on the gravestones.

**Lakeview Cemetery, Broomfield, Colorado**

The City and County of Broomfield own Lakeview Cemetery, an active cemetery incorporated in 1890. The City and County of Broomfield are located in central Colorado. The website contains an alphabetical listing of burials to 1955, a plat map of the cemetery, and a list of lot owners. The sources of the information for this index are copies of the original burial books housed at the Broomfield Depot Museum and a cemetery survey done in 1997.

The data fields in the cemetery index are name, age, date of death, block, lot, and comments. The data fields in the list of plot owners, which is likely incomplete, are name, block, and lot.



Another member recently passed away: **Janice Reynolds** was a long time member of WVGS. She passed away in Salem on May 31, 2012. Janice was interested in her Norwegian heritage.

At our General Meetings we take a collection to purchase a book in the deceased member's name. That book then is donated to the Oregon State Library with a label saying "In memory of ....".
