Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's DNA Project

WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women. To join under WVGS:

1. Go to the State Library URL at: <http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml>
2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
3. Click on WVGS DNA Project.
4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form.
6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen.
7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one set.

You will receive a confirmation in your e-mail box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA. It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

NEW! Discover close relatives and your ethnic percentages with Family Finder! Available to both males and females.

Family Finder uses autosomal DNA (inherited from both the mother and father, four grandparents, eight great-grandparents, etc.) to provide you a breakdown of your ethnic percentages and connect you with relatives descended from any of your ancestral lines within approximately the last 5 generations.

Fold3 Update

WVGS subscribes to **Fold3** for members to have access to military records. **Fold3** is available at the Reference Desk on the 2nd Floor of the Library.

General orders are essential for coordinating an effective military. Whether for something as basic as distributing sweet potatoes to hospitals or more critical like penalties for those who aid deserters, orders issued to the Confederate Army in the U. S. Civil War were key to smooth operations and troop communications. These orders are compiled in 1,648 pages of image documents from the General Orders and Circulars of the Confederate War Department, 1861-1865, recently added to the Fold3 Civil War Collection.

Do you like solving mysteries...and detective work? We are looking for 3 volunteers to help people research their family history. The shifts available are Mondays 1-5 and Fridays 1-5. Typically, a volunteer fills one shift per week. The Genealogical Research Center is a partnership project of the State Library and WVGS.

Funding for the Government Research Services Team at the Oregon State Library

Oregon Heritage Vitality 2010/11

Following on the recommendation of the Oregon Heritage Commission, the 2011 Oregon Legislature approved HB 3210 to create a Legislative Task Force on Oregon Heritage Vitality. The Task Force reviewed existing information, conducted surveys and took public testimony before submitting its findings and recommendations to the Legislature in September 2012. The study identified eight major challenges facing organizations and eight recommendations for the 2013 Oregon State Legislature.

- Gather the latest demographic information about your audience, city and county. Determine if your organization reflects that community and how you can meet your community's needs.
- Create a communications plan that effectively uses the print, electronic and digital media in your community.
- Enjoy what you do and celebrate your successes.

Native American Genealogy

Quoting from the FamilySearch Wiki on American Indian Genealogy:

"The Key to success in American Indian genealogy is the cross-disciplinary approach. One cannot just be a genealogist who pours through public records. Only the very lucky will find a census record with a notation that so-and-so was a Choctaw Indian. The task requires an expanded thought process where one must investigate all possibilities without tiring of the effort. The history of the family, community, county and state must be known. Church and local records must be examined for any clue regarding family origins. A successful researcher must also have an intimate knowledge of tribal history and culture."

Special books in the Oregon State Library that may help with Northwest Native American genealogy:

Many of the Federal Documents are in the Library's collection. These include hearings before the Select Committee on Indian Affairs. A few examples:

- ***Hearing Before the Select Committee on Indian Affairs One Hundredth Congress* 1988** contains testimony by tribe members of the Northwest about their grandparents and great-grand parents.
- ***Report of the commissioner of Indian affairs to the secretary of the interior* 1868, 1909-1920**, contains reports from Indian agents
- ***Indian affairs in the Territories of Oregon and Washington* Reprint of the 1858 edition**

Other books in the Library's collection:

- ***The Rolls of Certain Indian Tribes in Washington and Oregon* 1969**, contains enrollment lists, statements by members, genealogies, pictures.
- ***Catholic Church records of the Pacific Northwest* early French Canadian trappers of the Hudson Bay Company married Indian women. Records often give their tribe, earliest 1838 to 1898 in St. Paul, OR.**

And don't forget that Ancestry.com, available for free on the Reference Room computers has Indian Census Rolls for various years and tribes.



Research

Alaska Archives

The Alaska State Archives has made a number of resources available on its website. Click on the For Researchers link to access them. The resources include but are not limited to:

- **Territorial Governors Letterpress Books**
This online collection contains the digitized images of letters of territorial governors for the period from 1884 to 1919. This is a work in progress. You can view the books file by file (scroll to the bottom of the page to find the links) or click on the By Subject
- **Probate Index**
The probate index comprises approximately 17,000 probate cases. The cases were administered in the district court system, which served Alaska from 1884 until the Alaska State Court system was established in 1960. The types of cases indexed include estates, guardianship of minors, adoptions, search and rescue, and sanity hearings
- **Naturalization Records**
The naturalization database serves as an index to 6,045 records created in the district courts of Juneau, Petersburg, Skagway, Wrangell, Nome, and Cordova. The index is arranged alphabetically by surname.
- **Military Service Records**
The Alaskan Legislature passed an act in 1923 that required compiling a list of all Alaskans who served in the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps during World War I. The Secretary of Alaska placed the list in the Territorial Auditor's Office of all Alaska Territory residents who served in these branches between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918. The data has been transcribed to spreadsheets and converted to PDF files. The data fields in the Service Personnel Information file include the individual's name, age, residence, place and date of entry, branch of service, service record, and date, place, and type of discharge. There is a second file that contains information about individuals who died while in the service.

After months of hard work, the enhanced FamilySearch.org experience has been launched to the world. At the core of the new experience is Family Tree, the future replacement for new.familysearch.org. Family Tree is a single, universal pedigree that offers new ways to discover, preserve, and share your family story:

- Collaborate on common family lines
- Make corrections and add sources
- Add ancestor photos and stories

View your ancestors in an interactive fan chart

All of these Family Tree features are live today and are available to all users of the site. Note that photos and stories tools will be made available to a certain number of new users per day to ensure that the system continues to run smoothly.

The Digital Public Library of America

The Digital Public Library of America (DPLA) brings together the riches of America's libraries, archives, and museums, and makes them freely available to the world.

The DPLA offers a single point of access to millions of items—photographs, manuscripts, books, sounds, moving images, and more—from libraries, archives, and museums around the United States. Users can browse and search the DPLA's collections by timeline, map, format, and topic; save items to customized lists; and share their lists with others. Users can also explore digital exhibitions curated by the DPLA's content partners and staff.

The DPLA contains metadata records—information describing an item—for millions of photographs, manuscripts, books, sounds, moving images, and more from libraries, archives, and museums around the United States. Each record links to the original object on the content provider's website.

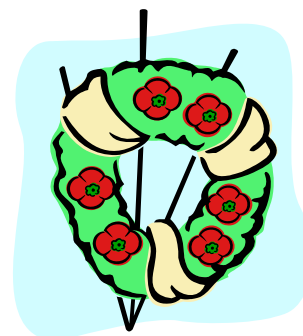
