development of the carousel at Salem's Riverfront Park which opened in 2001. Her latest historic project was the Oregon State Hospital Museum of Mental Health. Hazel Patton is a dedicated community volunteer who has helped spearhead several high-profile projects in Salem, including Riverfront Carousel, the Union Street Railroad Pedestrian Bridge and the Oregon State Hospital Museum of Mental Health. She is president of the Oregon State Hospital museum board.

Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's DNA Project

WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women. To join under WVGS:

- 1. Go to the State Library URL at: http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml
- 2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
- 3. Click on WVGS DNA Project.
- Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
- 5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form.
- 6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen.
- 7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one set.

You will receive a confirmation in your e-mail box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA. It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

NEW! Discover close relatives and your ethnic percentages with Family Finder! Available to both males and females.

Family Finder uses autosomal DNA (inherited from both the mother and father, four grandparents, eight greatgrandparents, etc.) to provide you a breakdown of your ethnic percentages and connect you with relatives descended from any of your ancestral lines within approximately the last 5 generations.

The DNA Project is open to anyone, not just WVGS members. You are not charged until you send in your test kit. You can do the DNA testing through WVGS and submit it to other groups.

WVGS Databases on Ancestry.com

In Ancestry's agreement with WVGS, Ancestry agreed to index WVGS materials that are on **ancestry.com**. Ancestry says there was "some confusion" on this issue, so although the databases are on **ancestry.com** (you can find them under Oregon, Marion County), they still have not been indexed. This means they can be browsed, if you know the databases are there, but searches will not come up with any links to our collections.

Part of Ancestry's selling point was that we would receive more research requests as subscribers found information from our collection on the site. Obviously this hasn't happened since the databases still are not indexed. Beginning in July 2013 our databases will be added to Ancestry's **Ancestry World Archives Project.** This means our collections will be indexed by volunteers.

Ancestry says "The Ancestry World Archives Project is a collaborative effort that has allowed thousands of people around the world to help preserve history that would otherwise be lost. Would you like to give back to the genealogy community? Help families discover more of their stories and share them with future generations. The Ancestry World Archives Project lets you help us bring free historical record collections to the public".

Reorganization at the Oregon State Library

The Oregon State Library will be re-organizing, implementation beginning in July 2014. However we still have no idea what that means to our Society. A project manager has been hired to oversee the re-organization process.

Meanwhile, our Board has decided that this is an opportunity for us to take a look at our society activities. There are some projects that our society needs to do. Members at the June meeting approved forming three committees for the following specific purposes.

1) Inventory of WVGS holdings.

We need to have an updated inventory of WVGS materials of all kinds. This includes books belonging to WVGS, as well as CDs and Society books stored in the Annex at OSL. Also books and periodicals donated to OSL belong to WVGS should our agreement end , so we need to inventory books, shelf space , periodicals, CDs, equipment, microfilm, etc.

2) Computer and Technology.

Currently our website is part of the OSL website. We need to have our own independent site. This committee will investigate all aspects and costs involved in setting up our website. We also will need a webmaster. Other technology, internet, and computer issues will be looked also.

3) Funding and Fundraising.

We may be required to pay rent to OSL or to find another place. We will need additional funds from donations, grants, or trusts. How do we get additional funds? What can we do to get members more involved and expand our reach?

Do you have computer expertise, perhaps to be our webmaster or maybe you have written grants? Perhaps you can help out our society by just serving on one of these committees. This is a time for change and we need start by looking at these three issues. Get involved!

Memorandum of Understanding

Each biennium, WVGS and the Oregon State Library sign a Memorandum of Understanding. This document lists the responsibilities of WVGS and the Oregon State Library. Previously WVGS agreed to donate resources to OSL, assist with training and recruiting volunteers, promote Ancestry.com and allow OSL to use our digitizing equipment. OSL agreed to provide facilities for WVGS and the general public, provide support for volunteers, maintain the genealogical collection (which reverts to WVGS should the OSL be unable to maintain it), provide cataloging and maintain the website.

This agreement is usually signed in June for the next biennium. This has not been done for 2013-2015.

Oregon State Hospital Museum of Mental Health

They called them "lunatics" and "idiots" and, of course, in a famous book and Oscar-winning film both created right here in Oregon, people who lived in a "Cuckoo's Nest."

Now, visitors to the new Oregon State Hospital Museum of Mental Health can decide for themselves as they peruse the histories of some of the thousands of patients — along with decades' worth of other artifacts — who have walked through the hospital's doors during its 130-year history. The museum opened on Oct. 6, 2012, about six months after the final buildings of the new, state-of-the-art Oregon State Hospital were completed

during an impressive remodeling project. The museum is housed in the only part of the original hospital, which opened in 1883 as the Oregon State Insane Asylum, that remains. It is on the first floor of the red-brick Kirkbride U Building on the hospital's campus, which lies just north of the Oregon State Penitentiary.

Open Tuesdays, Fridays and Saturdays from noon until 4 p.m. or by appointment. Adults \$4, students and seniors \$3. Members always free.

June Program

Don Garrett, Director of the East Family History Center, was our speaker for June. He learned early in his own research the importance of sources. For a trip to the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, prepare ahead of time. The catalog is online at familysearch.org. Books and CDs can't be sent here so research the ones you want to look at. Not all microfilm is on hand in Salt Lake, so notify the Library ahead of time which films you want.

Indexing of historical records is still an ongoing project. You can volunteer: Indexing is simple, convenient, and essential to making the world's records accessible. No special skills are required to make family record information accessible.

Familysearch.org changed in April. The biggest change is that Family Tree is open to all. You can access the Ancestral File and Pedigree File which have been combined for the same person, as well as upload or start your own tree.

WVGS Books

We maintain books for our members to check out. This is called our "Shelf List". In recent years, not many members have taken advantage of these books. They are kept in boxes at the Library and brought out to the Microfilm Room on some of our meeting days. We are publishing our list in this newsletter. If there are any books you are interested in, let Jim Willhite or Liz Tice know after the meeting. Both Jim and Susie have had back problems and bringing the boxes out has been more of a chore that it used to be. We're looking at other options, such as purchasing carts for the books to be stored on so that we could just roll the carts out. Thank you, Jim, for keeping the list updated!

In an announcement about the 1950 Census he said:

If you wondered how we produced free locational tools for the opening of the 1940 census on the Morse One-Step site, wonder no more and be part of the team to do the same thing for 1950. We have opened up 'Project 1950' to prepare searchable ED definitions and street indexes for the opening of the 1950 Census in 2022. With the help of about 125 volunteers we produced our 1940 tools, and now are looking for about 200+ volunteers to help with Phase I (transcription of Enumeration District definitions) and Phase II (creating urban area street indexes) for 1950. An explanation of the two phases and what needs to be done can be found at stevemorse.org/census/project1950intro.html. It may seem too early to be doing this, but it took us over seven years to produce the 1940 tools that were used by . . . millions of researchers."
