#### Newspapers

#### <u>Newspaper Reserch</u>

WVGS Board Members decided to subscribe to newspapers.com (owned by Ancestry.com) for six months. You can have a volunteer search for you on our laptops at Salem Public Library.

You are able to clip an article to save right on the site for later use. You also have to ability to save an article directly to your Ancestry.com family tree. And finally, you have the ability to share these discoveries via email and social media and you can save your searches as well!

The reason for doing this initially was that the Statesman Journal (under all it's various names since 1852) has now been digitized and is on newspapers.com. We want all members and the public to use this research. Come by the desk to have a volunteer do a search for you. Surprising results may turn up about your ancestors!

And don't forget, that while you are at Salem Public Library you can access the library catalog via their Wi-Fi. This means you can access their newspapers indexes online:

- Historic Oregon Newspapers: Explore this collection of historic newspapers from around Oregon. Free, you can access at <u>http://</u> oregonnews.uoregon.edu/
- InfoTrac Newsstand: Look for full-text articles from numerous American and Englishlanguage international newspapers. Requires a Salem Public Library card or access through our laptops.
- Oregonian (1987-current): Look for full-text articles in the Oregonian from 1987 to the present. Requires a Salem Public Library card or access through our laptops.
- Oregonian Index (1851-1987): Search this index for articles in the Oregonian. Visit the Oregon State Library to access the full-text articles on microfilm. This database can be searched at <a href="https://library.uoregon.edu/dc/newspaper/index.php?newspaper=oregonian">https://library.uoregon.edu/dc/newspaper/index.php?newspaper=oregonian</a>
- Statesman Journal (2002-current): Search for full-text articles in the Statesman Journal from 2002 to the present. Requires a Salem Public Library card or access through our laptops.
- Statesman Journal Digital Microfilm (2009current): Access scanned images of the Statesman Journal newspaper. Requires a Salem Public Library card or access through our laptops.
- Statesman Journal Index (1987-2002): Search in this index for Statesman Journal articles from 1987-2002. Visit the Salem Public Library to retrieve the full-text articles from the microfilm. This database can be searched at <u>http:// library.state.or.us/home/orind/</u>

#### January, 2017 By Jerry Rodgers Candalaria Terrace Collection

Nearly 2 years ago WVGS volunteers moved our book collection from the State Library to the Salem Public Library. It's been a wonderful new partnership with increased exposure to a broader public. The downside has been that our display space is smaller and there wasn't room for our collection of periodicals and family histories. Not wanting to lose this collection, a decision was made to store these materials in a rental space at Candalaria Terrace.

Since the move, WVGS volunteers haven't actively promoted or developed procedures to access this collection. That will change in 2017. Each month the newsletter will have an article featuring at least one collection at Candalaria. The article will include the extent and general description of information in the featured collection, as well as where available indexes can be found. If there is interest in a particular publication, feel free to ask. A review can probably be expedited for most requests.

There are currently two ways to see what is available at Candalaria:

- 1 Paper copy list in a notebook behind the Volunteer Desk at the Salem Library
- 2 Online at http://www.wvgsor.org (Click on the Materials link and scroll down to "Materials Stored Offsite")

Use the request link in the "Materials Stored Offsite" location when you find a publication or family history that you'd like to see. Required information on the request form is your name, contact information and volume(s) or year(s) requested. The material will be brought to the Salem Library and placed on the hold shelf behind the volunteer desk. You'll be contacted when the material is available. All WVGS publications are for reference only at the Salem Library and cannot be checked out.

Currently indexes for some of the collections are available at the library or online. The difficulty is that there is not a standard comprehensive index available for each periodical. The hope is that as each collection is reviewed, index information will be found that will help with research.

## Ethnic Resource

Our dedicated and hard working volunteer coordinator, Craig Smith, has been working on "Ethnic Resources". He as added a folder to our laptops at Salem Public Library title just that-Ethnic Resources. He is adding links as he finds them. Sample of folders are ones for countries of origin such as Denmark, Mexico, etc. He has also included Native American, Jewish and a general category Ethnic Resources Guides.

These resources are intended to help our volunteers work with patrons who are looking for information on their ancestors' country of origins. But certainly any member who is interested in seeing what Craig has put together can come by the Genealogy Volunteer Desk and check it out.

Craig is also working on a folder for Citizenship, Immigration and Naturalization.

### Balch & Corey

Bob Corey has donated several scrapbooks and genealogies about the Corey and Balch families (Bob Corey married Betty Balch). Bob was the owner of Salem's local fast food restaurant, Bob's 19-Cent Hamburgers.

Bob has compiled scrapbooks about Bob's 19-Cent Hamburgers, as well as his World War II experiences. He also has compile genealogies on his Corey family and his wife's Balch family.

Since this is a local family, we have put these scrapbooks in our Family Surname File, which is in a cabinet in our area at Salem Public Library. Come by and look them over!

#### Two Key Tips for Discovering Scottish Ancestry Family Tree Magazine 12/5/2016

- Naming patterns are clues. Scottish parents usually named their children following a specific pattern, which may result in names repeated within families. The firstborn son was named after the father's father, and the second-born son was named after the mother's father. Firstborn daughters were named after their mother's mother, and second-born daughters were named after their father's mother. Focus on the middle names to distinguish two or more family members with the same name.
- Knowing the parish is key. In order to research thoroughly, especially given the likelihood that several relatives will have the same name, you'll want to know the parish where your ancestor resided—as well as the surrounding parishes. That's because your family may have moved into neighboring parishes, but they were less likely to move to neighboring counties.

## **Constitution Revision**

In 1995, WVGS applied to become incorporated as a mutual benefit nonprofit. The Oregon Department of Justice has notified us that we are being reclassified as a public benefit nonprofit. Mutual benefit nonprofits are not required to have tax-exempt status which WVGS did not have until 1999. According to the Corporate Division, "Public benefit corporation includes entities which hold tax-exempt status from the Internal Revenue Service under Section 501c(3) and other groups organized for public or charitable purposes." This fits our organization, especially with our public activity at Salem Public Library. We are required to have members vote on the change from mutual benefit to public benefit. We will have a vote on the revision at the January 14, 2017 meeting.

The Constitution of the Willamette Valley Genealogical Society, Inc. shall be amended by adding the following as ARTICLE XII (current ARTICLE XII DISSOLUTION OF SOCIETY becomes XIII, current ARTICLE XIII RULES OF ORDER becomes ARTICLE XIV, current ARTICLE XIV AMENDMENTS becomes ARTICLE XV). Furthermore, this amendment shall be added to the Articles of Incorporation of said corporation, on file with the State of Oregon, Secretary of State, Corporation Division.

## ARTICLE XII INCORPORATION

Section 1

The Willamette Valley Genealogical Society was incorporated in the State of Oregon as a mutual benefit nonprofit on December 13, 1995. The society is organized exclusively for charitable purposes within the meaning of section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Willamette Valley Genealogical Society was determined by the IRS to be a non-profit organization on May 14, 1999, EIN 93-0703189.

On October 14, 2016, the Oregon Department of Justice and Secretary of State, Corporate Division, determined the Willamette Valley Genealogical Society is a public benefit corporation. The status change was ratified by a vote taken of the members on January 14, 2017. Page 6– January 2017

### Always Try to Find Original Documents!

Originals. True originals. Duplicate originals. Counterparts. Facsimiles. Photocopies. Scans. Digital copies. Image copies. Official copies. Record copies. Clerk's copies. Certified copies. Certificates. Transcriptions. Translations. Extracts. Abstracts. Nutshells. Indexes. Databases. Reprints. Are we confused yet?

Ancestry.com has many records in which you cannot see the original document, but must rely on someone else who has read the record and written what they saw. In many cases, this is a great help. As you know, the handwriting and spelling are often abominable.

Researching a fourth great-grandfather of mine has been a challenge. He is important to me as two of his great-grandchildren (2<sup>nd</sup> cousins) married and became my great-grandparents. He started as Johann George Schlauch born in Germany and became George Slough in Pennsylvania and Ontario, Canada records. There **is** a marriage record: **Catharine** "Gich", daughter of Adam "Gig", married in the parsonage of the Trinity Lutheran Church in New Holland, Lancaster Co, PA to Georg Schlauch of Caernarvon Township on 28 August 1764.


George Slough's land petition in Ontario, Canada in 1789 says he arrived with his wife Catharina and eleven children. Only one of his children has a record that specifically mentions Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. The death record for one of his sons, my 3<sup>rd</sup> great-grandfather, says he was born in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. It's frustrating that no baptismal records for any of the 11 children have been found. He left a good will and 10 of the children have records in Ontario. One daughter died about 1813, and from the will she was next to youngest, born about 1785. The closest record seemed to be from the *Register of marriages and baptisms kept by the Rev. Traugott Frederick Illing : in connection with the churches of St. Peter's (Lutheran), Middletown, and Caernarvon (Episcopal), Lancaster County, Penn'a, published in 1980 and available on Ancestry.com. However, the mother was cited as Susanna not Catharine.* 

The original handwritten manuscript is available on microfilm from the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. And guess what? It says the parents of Susanna were Georg and **Catharina** Schlauch.

Abstract:

Schlauck, Susanna, d. of George and Susanna Schlauck, h. Jan. 28, 1785; bap. March 29, 1785; witnesses, Peter and Susan Bohm.




I believe that original sources that do not rely on copying or using other records are the most accurate sources of evidence you can hope to find about an event. And they are worth tracking down. After all, geneal-ogists **are** detectives. This was an abstract, rather than a transcription (a transcription will copy every single thing from the original, word for word) and contained an error. This won't solve my problem of where the other 10 children were baptized but it does locate the family in Caernarvon Township in 1785, only four years before Georg arrived in Ontario, Canada.
