Dr. Stephen P. Morse is a famous computer inventor, professor, author and researcher. He invented the great-grandfather of the Pentium chips that power today's desktop computers. Steve Morse's site provides an interface to search databases with one step instead of the multiple steps required at the database's home site. Try it for vital records, immigration records, censuses, and more. He does not create databases, but rather has found better ways to mine existing databases.

His site has grown over time and it now addresses the following topics:

- Immigration
- Census (US, NY, Britain, Canada)
- Soundex Codes
- Vital Records (B-M-D, Naturalization)
- Calendars and Maps
- Transliterating in Foreign Alphabets
- Holocaust
- Genetic Genealogy

To get started, click "About this Website and How to Use It". You'll see some great examples of how and why you should use the various One-Step search tools.

The magic of his website is that it allows you perform a sophisticated database search, using numerous pieces of information, combined into one simple step.

The site's Ellis Island passenger list search option are some of its most used, offering more search capabilities thant the free Ellis Island Website.

Little-known aids on the website included several calendar conversions tools. You can also find language translation aids for Hebrew, Yiddish, Russian, Greek, Arabic, Japanese, Chinese and Old German.

Several of Morse's search tools pull data from Ancestry.com. To use these tools you'll need either an Ancestry.com subscription or us Ancestry Library Edition at a library.

The One-Step website contains a compendium of street-name changes and house-number changes for over 200 U.S. cities. website.



# **Family History Activities for Kids**

- Research has found that children who know their family stories have a higher self-esteem, stronger self-control, lower anxiety, fewer behavioral problems, and function better in a family. The study pointed out that it's not just knowing family history that's important. It's the process of talking with adults and learning the family narrative that leads to these positive outcomes.
- Are your grandkids looking for something to do while being isolated due to COVID-19?
- Below are several free, easy-to-do suggestions for activities that will keep kids entertained and get them thinking about their family history. These exercises are designed to teach critical skills while encouraging kids to explore their personal connection to the past. Studies show that young people who know facts about their heritage have a stronger sense of self, which can help them perform better in school and life.
- You can also
  - Create a calendar with birthdays of special ancestors.
  - Learn about the traditions and foods eaten by your ancestors.
  - Research and ancestor and then have a story swap.
