<u>Document Research:</u> Searches for Oregon documents can be done. If successful, the fee is \$10.00 per document or 3 for \$20.00 for nonmembers and \$5.00 per document or 3 for \$10.00 for WVGS members. If these require a trip to the Oregon State Archives, Marion County Clerk's Office or other sites, The fee is \$10.00 per document for members and non-members (3 for \$10/\$20 does not apply). The \$5 and \$10 charges include postage for 5 pages or less. If over 5 pages there will be a charge for postage and handling.

General Research

We will conduct searches using resources such as Ancestry.com, censuses, city directories, Oregon Donation Land Claims, newspapers, and other sources. General research is not restricted to research in Oregon only! The minimum fee for research is \$10, if successful. This includes a copy of one document. Research is \$10 per hour, \$5 for each additional 1/2 hour and the cost of additional documents. The \$5 and \$10 charges include postage for 5 pages or less. If over 5 pages there will be a charge for postage and handling. There is also a charge of 10 cents per page for every copy over 10 pages.

Membership for 2024

What to Expect from FamilySearch in 2024

Advances to Computer-Assisted Indexing

In 2024, FamilySearch will continue to improve its computer-assisted indexing algorithms to recognize and index historical genealogical records in Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, and English. Our handwriting recognition technology, coupled with the help of online volunteers, is making millions of record images text-searchable faster, vastly improving your ability to discover your ancestors worldwide.

Full-Text Search

On a related note, FamilySearch has been leveraging its state-of-the-art, Al-powered handwriting recognition technology to also improve its record search experience. We try to index the most important details of a record to help you find your ancestors. In 2024, we are working to make your search even more powerful by adding full-text search capability to select record sets.

FamilySearch senior product manager John Alexander told Deseret News that now they have more historical documents than they can keep up with.

"Here's the problem that we've been having: in order for those images to be useful and accessible for people to find their families on them, they need to be indexed," he said.

Only about 20% of the documents FamilySearch has access to today have been indexed. And while more than 2.6 billion historical resources have been indexed and are usable, more than 5 billion additional documents are still waiting. And new documents are being added to that waiting list at a historically high rate: roughly 1 to 2 million more are added every day.

"Even though we've tried to grow our family search indexing and get more people involved, digitization has gotten so much faster, we can't keep up," Alexander told Deseret News. "We can't index all of the images coming in the door."

So a new artificial intelligence is currently being tested and "taught" to read English, Spanish, and Portuguese, with plans for Italian later this year.

"In just a couple of hours, the computer can index more than you or I could do in a whole lifetime if we did nothing besides indexing for the rest of our lives," Alexander told Deseret News. "So in terms of efficiency, it's very fast." But a computer will always make mistakes, so human indexers will always be needed for quality assurance checks.

FamilySearch is not alone:

The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), in conjunction with Ancestry and FamilySearch, used artificial intelligence to index the 1950 US Census population schedules released in April 2022. Entries made by enumerators were scanned and transcribed then released for use at a much faster rate than what was accomplished with manual indexing performed for the 1940 US Census release in 2012. For the 1950 US Census, users were encouraged to review the transcriptions and submit corrections as part of a community effort by genealogists and other researchers.

Chances are you have already used Al in your genealogy. For example, when you start typing a search into Google, the list of possible searches that you get is generated by a form of Al.



The Willamette Heritage Center connects generations through gathering, preserving, and sharing Mid-Willamette Valley history. A visit to our site is a step back in time. Our five-acre property is home to fourteen historic structures that vividly weave together the story of the Mid-Willamette Valley and the development of today's diverse communities through permanent and changing exhibits, a research library and archive, a textile learning center, and rentable event spaces. Our site is also home to retail shops, cooperative artist studios, and offices for our partner organizations.

Explore the history and culture of the Kalapuya people, who have called this place home since time immemorial. Follow the immigration of 19th-century missionaries and Oregon Trail travelers. The 1841 Jason Lee House and Methodist Parsonage are the oldest standing wooden frame

houses in the Pacific Northwest, featured along with the John D. Boon House (1847) and Pleasant Grove Church (1858), built by Oregon Trail immigrants. https://www.willametteheritage.org/

What Books are in the Willamette Valley Genealogical Collection??

WVGS has about 5,000 books that are held at Salem Public Library. Although our books cannot be checked out from Salem Public Library, you can search our collection on our website. You do not have to be a member to do this.

- Go to the WVGS website at https://wvgsor.org/
- Click on the second choice on the top left: Materials
- ◆ Go down the page to The Catalogued Book Collection—Sorted by Subject (in yellow). The WVGS book collection is available for reference at the Salem Public Library. The PDF list of nearly 5,000 cataloged items is searchable. The list includes the book title, author, and Dewey number (the collection is filed at the library by Dewy number).
- Click on The Catalogued Book Collection. A pdf document will come up titled "WVGS Collection By Subject". Our recently added books (see above) have not been added to this but it is a list sorted by Subject 1 and Subject 2 of our books. Look for the subject that you are interest in such as Deschutes County, Oregon Land Records. You will find a book under

- If you plan on coming in to look at it, copy everything. Our books are on the shelf in Call Number order so all the Oregon books, for example, are not together on the shelf. A volunteer will help you find it.
