The 1950 Census is here! Our program will be a video presentation by Americanancestors.org, titled Discover the 1950 U.S. Census:

"With the release of the 1950 U.S. Federal Census, family historians of all levels are primed to uncover new-or to verify already-known—information about their ancestry. Using new machine learning and optical character recognition technology, this is the first time that a census will be searchable upon its release on the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) website. In this session, Vice President of Library and Research Services Lindsay Fulton will discuss what information is provided, how to search the indexed and non-indexed databases, and provide tips on how the 1950 census can be a springboard to other records.

Member Leland Gilsen of Salem said:

My father refused any info about his family until in his 90's when had some strokes. Left me a wrapped tin with photos and news/magazine bits he collected during his life. Probably illegitimate. Now looks probable raised by his father of his parent's close associates/friends. Dad said he lived over the garage of a house in Lake Forest and the street had something to do with deer. My brother went to Lake Forest and took photos of houses on East Deerpath. Dad picked out a house in 884 E Deerpath. House owned by Farwell (7/29/1825 to 8/30/1908). Have more about all of this.

The story is complex. Current clue is to look up the 1900 census to find John V farwell, born 1925 in either Chicago or Lake Forest as head of household. Check servants names, looking for Goodpasture steamship arrivals, Ne York summer of 1901 looking for Colin Campbell (rank captain or major at that time) if listed

might show where he planned to stay/visit?

I am 80 and my brother is 89. would like to solve this mystery. Now know the highly probable grandmother from DNA and \$2000 spent on a researcher who made fundamentally wrong assumptions about my father and his father but did find DNA connection with the Goodpasture's living in Beulah CO at the right time for his birth. Have ancestry, GEDmatch, FamilyTree Maker. Have dna for me and brothers (full and half but maternal) and a sister.

State Censuses



State Censuses

(This series was started in 2018 up until May 2020, but was not finished in the newsletters. The complete list was published in Beaver Briefs.)

UTAH State and colonial censuses

Utah took censuses in the years between the federal censuses. The dates are listed below. State census records may have columns that were different or more unusual than those found on federal censuses. The responses and years of coverage may give additional information on the family.

1914-1960 For six censuses of members of the LDS Church in Utah and beyond see the LDS Census Wiki page.

1905 In this year, the State Constitution made provision for a decennial census, but no record was found of any census taken in accordance with the constitutional requirement.

1872 Kane, Rich, Tooele and Utah counties list names.

1856 State census. Caution: this census was padded. Most listings are correct, but some were repeated, and in a few cases deceased people were listed.

1852 So called "Bishops' Report" now available online. A transcript is available in the FamilySearch book collection. Images are available on the Church History website.

1851 Used as a substitute for the 1850 federal census. See federal censuses.

Benefits of Digital Libraries

- Family history books from digital libraries have provided clues and information that you may never have found anywhere else. These books have been crucial not only for proving lineages or for personal research.
- Here are a few of the benefits of using digital libraries to find family history books:

Access to sources that you may not see in your everyday research. You might see a few digital books in your research at Ancestry, but probably not very many. Digital libraries will take you out of your "genealogy comfort zone" and into different sources.

Books can provide social context. Even if we find information about our ancestors that we don't like or want to know, the stories in digital books can give social context to our ancestors' lives. Genealogy isn't just about names and dates; it's about what happened "in the dash."

Always open and no need to leave home to use them.

Some Places to find Books

FamilySearch Digital Library

- The FamilySearch Digital Library contains more than 440,000 digitized genealogy and family history books and publications from the archives of family history libraries such as the Allen County Public Library, the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, and others.
- Included in the collection are family histories, county, and local histories, genealogy magazines and how-to books, gazetteers, medieval histories, and pedigrees. While some books are only viewable in a Family History Center, many can be viewed from as well as downloaded to your home computer.
- To access the FamilySearch Digital Library from within FamilySearch, click "Search" in the top menu, and select "Books" from the drop-down menu.

The Internet Archive

- The Internet Archive is a non-profit library containing millions of free books, movies, software, music, websites, and more. Today, the Internet Archive contains over 21 million downloadable books and texts, as well as 550,000 modern eBooks that may be borrowed by anyone with a free account.
- Look for family, county, and local histories, yearbooks, census records, newspapers, magazines, and even contemporary genealogy how-to books. Books on the Internet Archive are offered in many formats, including DAISY files for print disabled people.

HathiTrust Digital Library

- HathiTrust (pronounced "haw tea") is a partnership of academic and research institutions offering a collection of over 17 million titles digitized from libraries around the world.
- Books that are either uncopyrightable (i.e., some government works) or in the public domain can be searched and viewed in their entirety. Books that are still in copyright are considered "limited," and can be searched but not viewed, allowing you to decide whether or not to obtain a copy of the book from another source.

Google Books

- In 2015, Google Books claimed to have digitized over 25 million books. Sadly, the project slowed down at that point due to legal issues, and the current number of books is unknown.
- You can search for books on Google Books or from the Google.com search page. If you use the latter, be sure to narrow your results by selecting "Books" from the "More" menu.
- If a book is out of copyright or the publisher has given permission, you will be able to see a preview of the book, and in some cases the entire book. Some books are not viewable.

Member Jan Walker asked this question:

How do I Remove Items Glued in a Scrapbook

Martha Stewart says:

It's probably best to leave the photos and clippings where they are. Only a conservator can tell what type of adhesive was used to attach the items and what kind of solvent will safely remove it. If you try to detach the pieces yourself, you'll likely cause them to tear. But even if freeing the pictures were a risk-free prospect, conservators would probably still advise against it. "An album is more than the sum of its parts," says Adrienne Lundgren, senior photograph conservator at the Library of Congress. "When you disassemble it, you lose the historical context, the sequence and format that the creator designed."

Other sites:

Step 1

• Examine the paper and glue quality. Glue that adheres to strong quality paper will be easier to remove. Old or antique paper may need special handling. Remove paper items from semi -wet glue by peeling them away from the surface. Wipe excess glue off with a sponge. Let the paper item dry face down before re-adhering. The paper will curl as it dries.

Step 2

 Heat the glue. Use a hair dryer or heat gun to warm up the attached paper items in the scrapbook. Keep settings on low to avoid burning the paper. Heat can soften the glue, making it easier to remove.

Step 3

 Use scissors or a credit card to remove glue. Delicately slide the credit card or scissors between the layers of paper. Pull the paper item up slowly away from the glued surface. Take care not to rip paper from the scrapbook. Re-heat the surface area to make the glue more malleable.

Step 4

Apply a solvent or acetone with a cotton swab to break down the glue. Dab at the glue with
the solvent carefully. If the paper structure attached to the glue gets too damp, allow to dry
before trying again.

Or:

- Dunking the photo into hot water to get the backing off may be quick but is not a good idea. The hot water can damage not only the writing on the back but also the image itself.
- The better way is to take your time and be patient. To do this, you will need a pallet knife or
 a butter knife. Gently pry the photo off the black paper (it should come up fairly easily since
 the black paper is brittle) while keeping the photo flat. If you try to bend the photo back too
 much, you can crack the image layer or crease the photo which will leave lasting damage.
- Once the photo is off the page, place it face down on a clean, smooth surface gently, and I
 mean very gently, scrap the excess black paper off the back with an icing spatula or a butter knife that does not have any serrations. Don't scrape too far as you will damage the
 photo but you should be able to get down to being able to read the writing on the back.

For Magnetic Albums

- If the photos seem to be easily removed, you may do so carefully.
- However, if there is a bit of resistance, do not attempt any further. Try either of the following methods to remove the hard-to-detach photo.
- Chemical solutions Choose adhesive removers that contain heptane, a chemical used for removing stickers and labels. With the use of a spatula or scraper, let the ample amount of chemical seep beneath the stuck photo. The chemicals can evaporate quickly, so there's no need to worry.
- Physical method Slide a sufficient length of dental floss underneath the corners of the stuck photo. Carefully slide it in a sawing-like motion until the floss passes all throughout.
- Heat application Try to heat the photo with a hairdryer. Make sure it is tolerable enough to lessen the chances of overheating the photo's surface.

There's lots of online advice, but be very, very careful. Scan if possible.
